

R210 000 DONATION HELPS UFS LAW STUDENTS GAIN VITAL SKILLS

Students in the Faculty of Law at the University of the Free State (UFS) are set to benefit from the establishment of a new moot court, following a donation of R210 000 by PPS, the specialist financial services provider to graduate professionals.
