

SA UNIVERSITIES SHARE IN R1-MILLION CASH INJECTION FROM LOCAL INSURER

PPS, leading specialist insurer that caters exclusively for graduate professionals has recently granted monetary donations, totalling more than R1-million to seven local universities, for oncampus refurbishment projects. These include the Universities of Limpopo, Western Cape, Fort Hare, Zululand, KwaZulu-Natal, Pretoria and WITS University.

PPS' refurbishment sponsorship initiative complements its scholarship and bursary programme, which provides funding to students studying in their 4th academic year, towards professional careers.

PPS awarded approximately R200 000 to the University of KwaZulu-Natal, for the refurbishment of the foyer of the Admin Building, on its Westville Campus; and R230 000 to the University of Pretoria, towards the acquisition of sophisticated IT equipment. The University of Pretoria's Academia Latina received an amount of R150 000, for the third consecutive year, to develop, maintain and promote use in the Latin language and its use in legal and medical terminology.

The University of the Western Cape, WITS, Zululand, Fort Hare and Limpopo Universities also received sizeable donations.

"In difficult financial times, money for refurbishments is hard to come by. Contributions, like this one from PPS, enable us to have world class facilities," says Professor TD Chetty, Pro-Vice Chancellor for Corporate Relations at the University of KwaZulu-Natal.
